Mystery Location – December edition.

The December Mystery Location was Glendon. The image was taken 100m east of the T junction (at the top of Glendon Road) looking in the direction of Rothwell.

Mrs Ann Jones of Rothwell correctly identified the location and sent in an interesting letter describing the memories that the image brought back to her. This letter is published on page 15.

No mystery location this month but an image from my archives which I thought may be of interest. It is an aerial view of the junction of Station Road and High Street showing 'The Thornhill Arms' and what is now known as Woodyard Close just behind it. The image was taken over 50 years ago in the early 1970's.

A letter from Mrs Ann Jones. (Née Atterbury). – Dec 2024.

To the editors of the Rushton ‘Triangle’.

I look forward to your magazine every month, bringing back happy memories of my childhood in Glendon and Rushton.

The mystery location in the December edition brought back memories of waiting for the school bus to take me to the Central School in Kettering. It shows the Kettering to Rothwell Rd. just before the junction to Rushton Rd. The railings to the right surrounded Image Field belonging to Glendon Hall. Before WW2 this field had statues displayed in it. During the war my father, Bill Atterbury, was farm bailiff and had to organise the removal of these Greek style statues to cultivate the land to help the war effort.

At harvest time everyone helped to get the harvest in, adults and children. We worked as long as the light would allow us. When all was safely gathered in we travelled by tractor and trailer to the Rushton pub for a well-earned drink.

This part of the road I knew well as I stood and waited for the bus. At the junction to Rushton was a grass triangle with a tree standing in the middle. I was told that in bygone days it was a hanging tree where people could be hanged for stealing a sheep or a rabbit.

Several years ago the BBC Time Team found remains of a mediaeval village nearby so it could be true.

There was a door in the wall on the left-hand side opposite Rushton Rd which could be used by servants who would walk to Glendon Hall for work. Behind the wall on the left were the kitchen gardens with green houses etc. We had Land Girls come to help produce food for the nation when we needed it most. One of these girls married the young gardener.

Standing under these trees could be a bit spooky in the dark mornings and evenings getting on and off the school bus. Only me waiting alone near the hanging tree.

A Robin built a nest in the disused letterbox in the Hall gateway and birds would sing in the quiet country lanes as the trees changed colour with the seasons. Happy memories of days gone by. I had a long walk from Woodfield Farm but no traffic to worry about as I stood in the shade of those lovely trees.

Problems are also published on the **FixMyStreet** website, so you can browse your local area and see what the prevalent problems are and what's been fixed.

You can also upload a photo to help show what the issue is.

Once you've sent your report, it goes straight to the council, who will get back in touch with you directly.

POINT TO PONDER FOR JANUARY 2025

What is in store for us as we enter another new year? Will it be the same dreadful wars and conflicts or will there be peace on earth? Will the advent of assisted dying enhance our human dignity or change our perceptions about how we should care for the living? Will the return of Donald Trump to the White House make for a better and safer world? Will the cost of living be more bearable? Will we feel more comfortable in safeguarding the welfare of our children, the elderly and the vulnerable in our society? Will we be less anxious about the future or more at ease with our daily living? We cannot avoid asking questions about what things will be like in this life! One thing is certain “there is nothing new under the sun” (Ecclesiastes 1:9) We have never lived in the “big rock candy mountain” (as sung by Burl Ives) nor do we inhabit a world entirely devoid of love and goodness. It is natural for us to despair at the situation we encounter in whatever year of our existence but that is but a sign that we have love in our hearts and lives. We should let that be the encouragement we can share with one another to overcome life’s difficulties and not feel crushed by them. We live in a world where things can be cruelly wrong but also where things can go beautifully right. We need to take stock of ourselves and in the process discover that there are more blessings in our lives than we often take for granted. God made us to reflect his grace and despite what may happen we cannot lose that truth however hard it may be to find it. We will then find that there is more laughter than tears as well as more resources to help those in need. It would be good to hear more voices in the new year from pulpits or podiums about the potential for good in human beings. In this way we could all help one another to build a better world. As George Eliot puts it, “it is never too late to be what we might have been.”

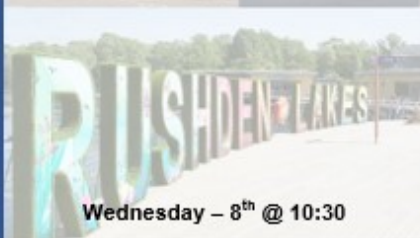
