A message from Andy

**“You knit me together in my mother’s womb...
I thank you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully
made.”**

Psalm 139:12–13



As I write this, it is only October, yet already some of us are thinking about Christmas. The shops have begun to hint at it, the first adverts are creeping onto our screens, and perhaps a few of us are quietly making lists. But before we get there, we still journey through Halloween, Bonfire Night, Remembrance Sunday, and the season of Advent. Christmas may feel close, yet there is much still to come.

If you are a knitter, though, you probably started thinking about Christmas long ago. Our own Trinity Threaders certainly have. They are a wonderful group who meet at Holy Trinity Church every Monday morning to knit, crochet, chat, laugh, and support one another. Their hands are rarely still, and every year our town benefits from their creativity. It won't be long before the poppies appear again, bright against the autumn air. Soon the knitted soldiers will stand proudly along the church railings, quietly honouring those who served. And before we know it, nativity sets—each one handcrafted with love—will appear on sideboards and windowsills, reminding us of the story at the heart of the season.

All this made me wonder about Christmas jumpers. Most of us have one tucked away somewhere: perhaps a handmade treasure, or more likely a shop-bought creation in blazing colours. Some flash or sparkle, others jingle with tiny bells. They feature everything from penguins to

dinosaurs, and classics like stars, puddings, and snowmen. I must admit I am usually a bit of a bah humbug about Christmas jumpers. But recently I was reading *The Twelve Joys of Christmas* by Nicholas Papadopoulos—something you might come across in church this year—and it made me think again.

He writes, “*Christmas jumpers are tasteless. And here’s the thing. God is tasteless too. That’s actually the heart of the good news. God is without a shred of cultural aesthetic judgment... The psalm presents God as carefully weaving us into being, knowing our every stitch and every knot—knowing our depths and knowing our darkness—and yet still being born among us in Jesus, still loving us. God has no taste. God does not discriminate. God does not exclude.*”

And perhaps that is the real joy: that we are, each of us, fearfully and wonderfully made. Maybe this year I will wear my Christmas jumper with pride.

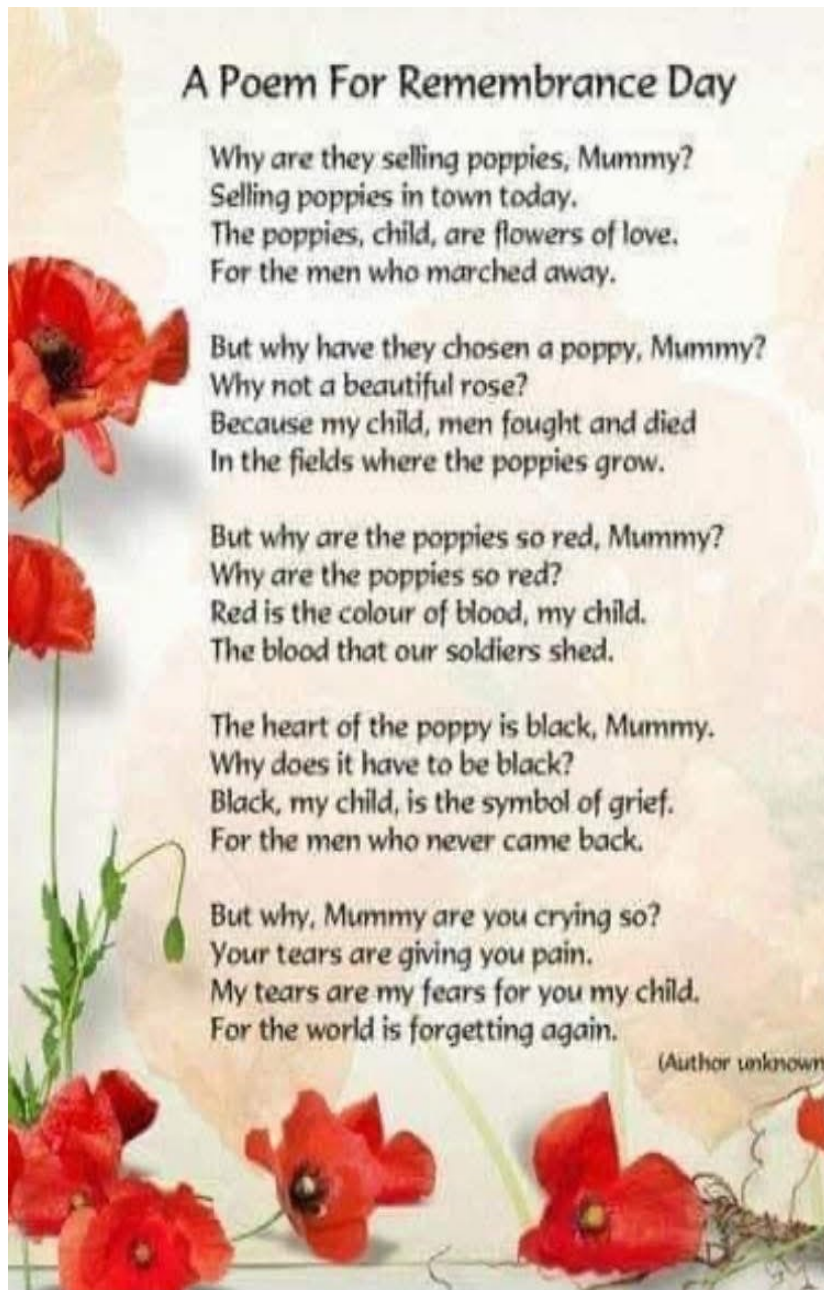
Because of these rising costs, we are doing all we can to use our resources wisely. One way we can care for both our finances and our environment is by reducing the days we heat the whole church building to Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays. We will, of course, continue to provide heating for special events where this is included in the hiring fee, and small groups may still meet on other days using the warm area near the kitchen with the small wall heater. If you have further ideas for saving money or using our space more efficiently, we would love to hear them—your creativity is a gift to us all.

Alongside reducing costs, we are also exploring ways to grow our income with generosity and community at the heart. This includes planning more events, increasing activities, and making greater use of our venue. Your support—whether by attending, inviting others, or helping us spread the word—makes a real difference. If you haven't already, you might also consider signing up for *Easy Fundraising*, which allows a small donation to come to the church every time you shop online, at no cost to you. Every little act of generosity adds up.

And finally, a gentle reminder: if you are a UK taxpayer, giving by standing order rather than cash in the offertory plate allows the church to claim Gift Aid, increasing the value of your donation at no extra cost. Planned Giving also helps us budget and care wisely for the resources God has entrusted to us.

We are truly thankful for all the ways you support the church—your time, your presence, your ideas, your prayers, and your generosity. Together we continue to sustain and strengthen this important part of the Rothwell community.

Our annual weekend visit to the Shrine at Walsingham took place in October, when four of us joined with ten people from other churches in the district.



As soon as we reach the village of Walsingham we are in a different world. It has been a place of pilgrimage since medieval times, and is known as England's Nazareth, following a vision from the Virgin Mary to Richeldis de Faverches, to build a house replicating the house where the Annunciation took place. It is a very peaceful place.

There are beautiful gardens, and three full size crosses are situated on a grassy mound in the grounds. As well as the Holy House, the church is almost as large as a cathedral, and it is always packed with visitors for the various services. Many of the services are quite emotional, particularly the Healing service and the Sprinkling of the Well, where we receive a Blessing with Holy Water. On the Saturday evening during the service everyone follows the Effigy of Mary through the gardens in the dark, carrying a candle and singing Ave Maria, creating a lovely procession of light.

The food is really delicious and we all sit together on long tables, so it is all very friendly. It is a great atmosphere and we enjoy meeting other people from different parts of the country.

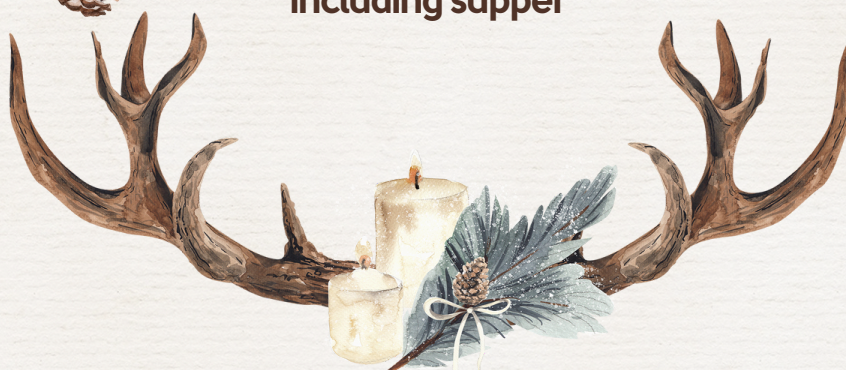

Point to Ponder

The infant Jesus did not have a welcoming committee when he entered this world in Bethlehem. His mother Mary laid him in a rough crib which she had hastily fashioned from a manger and wrapped him in strips of cloth as his first baby outfit. The story writer tells us this because “*there was no room for them in the inn.*” (Luke 2 verses 1 to 7). It was a miracle in our eyes that the child survived such a birth under such squalid conditions!

The first to hear of this event in the history of the world were also his first visitors, local shepherds. The socially correct of that day looked down on them because of their rough and ready lifestyle. Ironically, they were also symbols of God’s love in a religious tradition that Jesus would take to

describe himself. (Psalm 23, John 10 verse 11) These were God's choices in the first pictures we have of the birth of Jesus.

As he grew up and into the society of His day, he would encounter the faithful and the traitors in the whole spectrum of human nature. He came into the world as it is, in great poverty to enable it to discover the richness of the dimension of heaven and the love of God. He also enters the lives of everyone to assure us all, that the God who created everyone's humanity never leaves anyone desolate.

Christmas is the celebration of letting God be God in His love of humanity and in His creation. The overcrowded inn at Bethlehem reminds us He does not do deals with us. He does not select those we may think worthy of His attention and give them special favours. Divine love to be genuine can never be exclusive. God is the one, as the old Christmas carol puts it, who "*feels for all our sadness, and He shares in all our gladness.*" Empathy is not a weakness of the faithful but a challenge to the traitors who deny the place of joy in a society that knows more tears of pain than laughter.

We know that we live in a world where people do not care for one another or make room for the vulnerable or the defenceless. However, the Festival of Christmas in letting us see God as He is, can also be a wonderful opportunity to let us reveal our humanity in its true colours. We must not overlook the incredible generosity that Christmas encourages, inspires, and renews in people of good will towards the needy, the war torn and the afflicted. This happens because love is in the very fabric of the universe and we reveal this truth in goodness, kindness, and generosity. The shepherds left the inn with joy when they saw the infant Jesus. (Luke 2:20) We also are never the same again when we allow the truth of His birth to be born in our hearts.

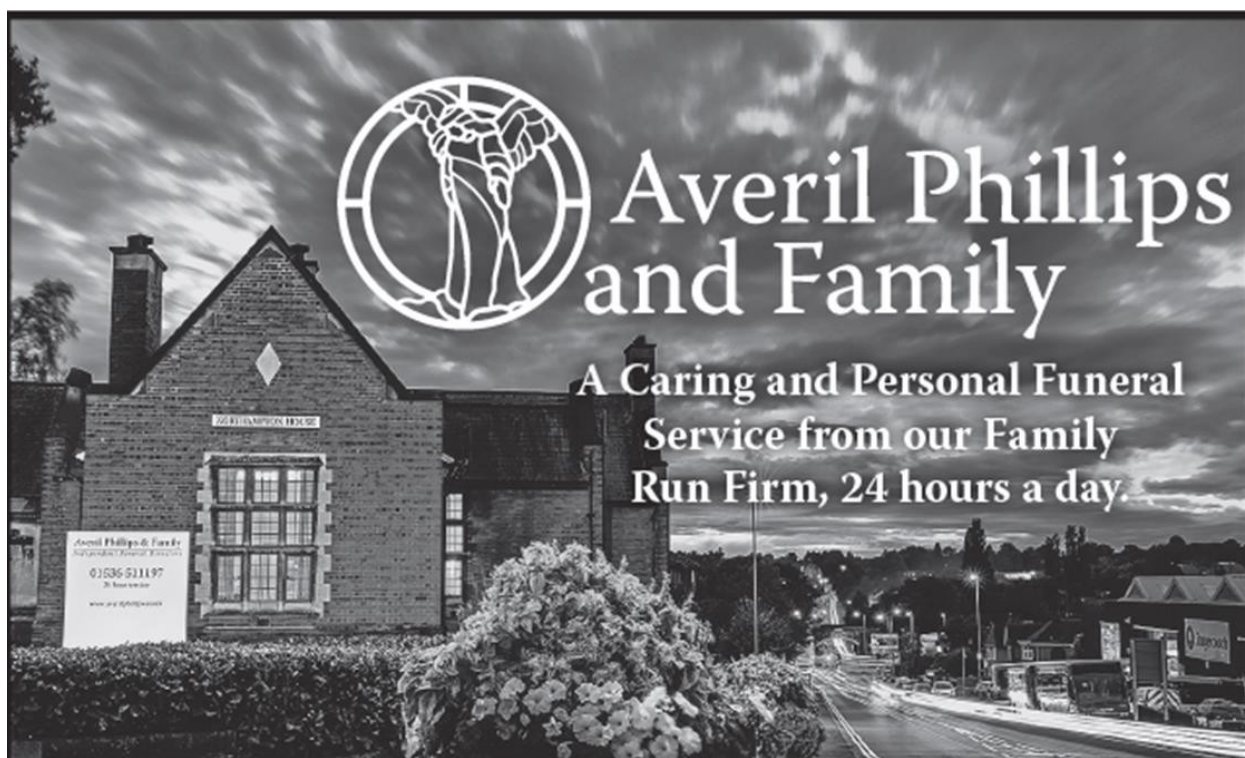
