A message from Andy

Do You Love me? John 21:15-25

If you're a fan of America's Got Talent on tv Jane Marczewski, also known as Nightbirde, sang a song of her own composition, called "*It's Okay*". When she spoke to the panel of judges before her performance, she revealed that she had been dealing with cancer in her lungs, spine



and liver. "I'm okay," she told them. She carried on, saying, "It's important that everyone knows that I'm so much more than the bad things that happen to me." Afterwards, she told the panel, who were clearly moved, "You can't wait until life isn't hard any more, before you decide to be happy."

On her website she wrote:

I have had cancer three times now, and I have barely passed thirty. There are times when I wonder what I must have done to deserve such a story. I fear sometimes that when I die and meet with God, that He will say I disappointed Him, or offended Him, or failed Him. Maybe He'll say I just never learned the lesson, or that I wasn't grateful enough. But one thing I know for sure is this: He can never say that He did not know me... Call me bitter if you want to – that's fair. Count me among the angry, the cynical, the offended, the hardened. But count me also among the friends of God. For I have seen Him in rare form. I have felt His exhale, laid in His shadow, squinted to read the message He wrote for me in the grout: "I'm sad too."

Sometimes Jesus doesn't wait for the shockwaves of a trauma to die down. He doesn't wait for us to be in full health, or for our anger, guilt and resentment to subside. He doesn't wait for us to recognise him, or for our permission to bring us new life, stir up goodness and truth, and show us that we are truly God's representatives in this world. He doesn't even wait for us to be happy, or for our decision to turn (or return) to God. Sometimes Jesus is just there before us, on the lake shore, offering to feed and teach us, requiring in return that we feed and teach his lambs.

We are not yet the people that God created us to be – none of us are. Our new life may begin with encountering Jesus and being baptised with the Spirit, and new opportunities and challenges, new learning and new discoveries, will open our eyes and hearts on the way and convert us again and again to Jesus' love – bringing courage, inspiration and joy, but for some of us Jesus asks that question – Do you love me? And for many of us the answer is not an easy one, we have spent many years doing the religious stuff the church asks of us, we've given our time, our money and done what is asked. But Jesus asks none of that, of course giving shows where our priorities are and our commitment to the church, but what Jesus really asks is

Do you love me?

The churchyard has, once again, come to life with the warmer weather; trees have blossomed, bees have been swarming, our wildflower seeds have germinated and the Swifts have arrived to nest in the tower.

Swifts are under threat as their population halves every twenty years. They are the most amazing birds. They eat, drink, preen, sleep and mate while flying, only landing to build their nest. They come to Europe in early May and make their way back to Africa at the end of July, a round trip of 14,00 miles.

What's the problem?

- Swifts nest in old buildings
- Old buildings are being knocked down and repaired
- New buildings have no nooks and crannies for Swifts
- Swifts are faithful to their nest sites
- When Swifts arrive back from Africa to raise a new family, they find their nesting places have gone they are homeless.

We are fortunate to see these birds returning to our church each year so please watch them for the short time they are here, learn about them and enjoy them. If you would like to find out more there is a little booklet "*I* am a Swift" pinned to the Eco board at the back of the church.

This month we will be visited by the judges from the *Wildlife Trust* as we have applied for the *Bronze Award for Churchyard Conservation*. We look forward to sharing news with them of the work we have done in recent months and our plans for the future.

A Year with the London City Mission

Part 7

The Gift



As voluntary evangelists in London City Mission in the late '80s, we were occasionally deployed to other parts of the country. During Easter '88 we became conference staff for the annual Christian festival, Spring Harvest, at the Minehead Butlins resort. Our authoritarian leader, Rob, of course forbade us to enjoy any of the on-site entertainments. We were there to W-O-R-K from dawn until bedtime and if we found ourselves free, we were given strict instructions to offer ourselves up for any odd jobs.

One day, having had a session cancelled, Oliver, Chris and I defiantly piled ourselves into one of the overhead cable cars, feeling strangely liberated and giggling. Suddenly I spotted Rob below us, striding up and down near the staff headquarters. He seemed to be looking for someone. Probably us. As if on the same spring, we all ducked down into the carriage as we sailed unseen over his head! Actually, although we spent most of our time organising seating, it was a pleasant change from London. We were even allowed walks along the sea front during the evening mealtimes!

As our year as volunteers neared its end, the Mission gifted us all a surprise "Thank You" weekend away at a mansion on the Felixstowe seaside. Depressingly, however, this was going to be hosted by Rob who would provide a series of talks. Unexpectedly, Sam, our ally in Rob's inner circle, informed us that Rob was confined to his bed due to some back condition. And the Mission had no one else to replace him! We had a skip in our steps when we realised we would potentially have an

untroubled mini-holiday away. We were discussing this excitedly in the dining room the evening before, when suddenly Rob almost danced in, declaring that he'd been miraculously healed! He was ecstatic, but he seemed to be sucking all the previous enthusiasm from the room into himself.

The holiday home was lovely, but we had to attend our first lecture soon after arriving. Rob entered, a ball of fury and pain. He warned us that no one had better cross him as he was in constant agony and that it was only the strong painkillers that were keeping him going. This explained his 'miraculous' healing! His tempestuous talk seemed to use little scripture, though he carried a remarkably large Bible. Everything Rob said seemed critical or mocking towards us, whilst boosting his own importance. At one point, he inexplicably started shouting at us as we sat there stunned. He left the room dramatically, throwing his hefty Bible at us as a farewell gesture. We were all in rather a state of shock. Then something strange happened. I felt an overwhelming sense of peace and purpose. I stepped forward and suggested we pray. That serenity seemed to descend on us all. I prayed for Rob, for his illness, for us all. In my heart I felt a forgiveness and a care that went completely against my previous resentment to our leader. I told everyone to go off and enjoy the mansion and its seaside surroundings.

Later on, a strangely cowed Rob found me in the main lounge. Apparently his minions had reported everything back to him. He hugged me for a long time. I wasn't really sure how to process this, but from then on things changed. I certainly never heard a harsh word from him towards me again.

As our year with the London City Mission approached its close, events took a sudden, though in hindsight possibly predictable, turn. *To be continued* *Ian Scales*

"I know I always can trust you"

Towards the end of my recent sabbatical leave, I went to Lee Abbey on the North Devon coast for a Prayer Retreat to reflect upon retirement later this year.

One of the wise guides suggested it would be good to choose a "theme song" for this next stage in life. At first I didn't think



this was a very good idea! Then I remembered that on a previous visit, fifteen years ago, before my interview to be one of your Bishops, I sang a hymn on my prayer walks.

That hymn was "Father, I place into your hands the things I cannot do" by Jenny Hewer and it has been a special favourite ever since. It's a wonderful reminder of God's trustworthiness in the face of life's challenges. The verses cover the whole range of anxious questions; "What will I do?" "Where will I go?" "Who will I be?" "What about my family?" and "How will I cope?"

The final verse focusses on walking close to God and loving his people, the Church;

"Father, I want to be with you and do the things you do, Father, I want to speak the words that you are speaking too,

Father, I want to love the ones that you will draw to you."

It's a lovely call to pastoral leadership and it continues to inspire me after 39 years of ordained ministry.

But my wavering loyalty to God is overwhelmed by his faithfulness to me. In response to an enquiry about faith during a Question & Answer session with school children at the Cathedral, I said; "Faith is less about what you believe, more about who you can trust".

This month I celebrated the Golden anniversary of my Confirmation. After over 50 years of following Jesus, "I know I can always trust him."

Point to Ponder

One of the first songs we ever learn is "*Happy Birthday*." From the minute we are born we become part of our family history and the world community. Our date of birth is registered for identification purposes, and we enter on to the world stage as a human being. We have a name, and we have a place in our family history.

We hear stories and memories of the people who are our relatives which explain or fascinate or amuse us. The family tree, like old photos, helps to shape our sense of belonging and identity. Ancestry research is a big business and makes for some interesting TV programmes.

William Barclay, the prominent 20th century Scottish, New Testament scholar and broadcaster wrote "there are two great days in a person's life. The day we are born and the day we discover why." The second date is not found in the public calendar of events but in the secret diary of our hearts.

The "why" is always with us. What answers do we give to ourselves and to those close to us? Does our birth have a strong influence? Or family upbringing? Or events? Or one's circle of friends? It is vital to one's well-being to have times of questioning. There are no glib answers to the question "why," only challenges.

People who are in love with life wrestle and care passionately about the answers they discover. In the process they often find what they are looking for, namely their own awareness of the essence of love and that love is unconditional.

The real person who is "me" must be challenged to embrace the richness and diversity in love that is built into our existence. St Paul gives us this

message in his First Letter to the Thessalonians "encourage one another and build up one another."

William Barclay puts it this way "in the time we have it is surely our duty to do all the good we can to all the people we can in all the ways we can."

Every child that is born is a bundle of opportunities and hope. Today's world has many voices that talk people down and thwart human potential. When we hear them, we must question them and reject them if they deny someone their full humanity. The late Pope Francis was not afraid to remind us that there are people who need help to be full human beings.

As we work out in our own ways the journey of self-discovery may we be inspired by the words of Jesus that "in everything do to others as you would have them do to you." That is the challenge of God's love to everyone of us that we enjoy our birthright.

Brian Wren, the 20th century hymn writer puts it this way:

Together met, together bound by all that God has done, We go with joy to give the world.


