#### A message from Andy

If you have read the newspapers recently, one report that drew my eye is that there has been an explosion of 18-25yr olds giving their lives to Christ. The Times, Guardian and Telegraph have all been reporting it, and the evidence is clear: attendance and interest growth among young people is migrating into true discipleship.



Bearing in mind the cost of discipleship in Christ is nothing short of total surrender. Jesus Himself said in Luke 9:23, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me." This call is radical. It is not a comfortable or convenient Christianity, but one that requires the death of self, the endurance of suffering, and the prioritizing of God's kingdom over personal comfort, career, and even family. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, in his seminal work The Cost of Discipleship, wrote, "When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die." That kind of faith is expensive - not in monetary terms, but in the full devotion of one's life.

So why, in an age saturated with individualism, digital noise, and relativism, are 18–25-year-olds increasingly drawn to what some are calling "full-fat Christianity" - the unfiltered, unapologetic version of the faith that demands everything?

Firstly, many young adults are disillusioned by a watered-down, therapeutic version of Christianity. The "Jesus as life coach" model lacks power, challenge, and depth. In contrast, biblical Christianity offers a profound purpose: to live for something greater than oneself. In a world that constantly tells young people to "be true to yourself," the

gospel offers the paradoxical freedom of dying to self - and finding true life in Christ.

Secondly, the chaos of the modern world - mental health crises, cultural confusion, global instability - has led many to seek solid ground. The historic Christian faith offers an anchor: timeless truth, objective morality, and a loving but holy God who doesn't shift with the cultural winds. Young people are increasingly hungry for something real, something ancient, and something demanding. *Full-fat Christianity* doesn't shrink back from truth, even when it's countercultural - and this boldness is compelling.

Thirdly, the cost of discipleship is not just about sacrifice, but also about belonging and transformation. In committing fully to Christ, young believers are finding deep community, purpose, and spiritual power. They're not interested in performing religion; they want to encounter God. They want authenticity, not performance. Holiness, not hype. Gospel, not gimmicks.

Movements of prayer, revival, and church planting led by Gen Z and young Millennials are growing - not in spite of the high cost, but because of it. They see that Jesus doesn't offer an easy life, but He offers a resurrected one. And they are discovering that costly obedience leads to unshakable joy.

In summary, the resurgence of *full-fat Christianity* among 18-25yr-olds is a sign of spiritual hunger for the real Jesus - not the domesticated, culturally safe version, but the crucified and risen Lord who calls His followers to come and die - and truly live.



#### Support for the Eye Hospital in Ghana



Our regular readers may well remember Janet Clements' article in August 2024 about the eye hospital in Ghana where Sister Aba from the Order of the Holy Paraclete works. We met Sister Aba during our retreat last year and again this

year.

Some years ago, I had cataract surgery on both eyes — not at the same time but completed within six months. Instead of continuing to have growing impaired vision, I was fortunate enough to be treated successfully and free of charge under the NHS. I still remember the immediate difference the surgery made with everything in sharp focus once again and colours appearing brighter than ever. People in Ghana are not so fortunate unless they happen to find treatment in such places as the Anglican Eye Hospital.

Blindness in Ghana is mostly caused by injury and poverty. Among them are many blind children who get no help whatsoever in ordinary schools and they can only attend special schools for the blind if their parents can afford to pay. The Anglican Eye Hospital is able to offer help with fees, buying uniforms and taking care of medical needs. Some families even reject their blind children so guardians are found for these children. The hospital relies on donations.

At the eye hospital some 200 patients are seen, without appointment, each day between 8.00am and 3.30pm, with queues forming from around 6.00am. This is all part of the daily life of Sister Aba and the present 38 members of staff. Each time we have met Sister Aba she has been taking a short, well-earned break within the community of St

Hilda's in Whitby, being supported and cared for within the routine of community life. She talked to us about her training, the setting up of the eye clinic with just 3 members of staff in 2002 to its upgrading to hospital status in 2019.

Being moved by the dedication of Sister Aba, we decided to hold an afternoon tea in Holy Trinity which took place on Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> August and raised the amazing sum of £380 which I had the pleasure of taking to St Hilda's in Whitby early September. The sisters were most appreciative!

#### **Eco News**



What do we recycle at church?

**Blister Packs**. A black sack is filled with these in 2-3 weeks and taken to Boots the Chemist for recycling; these would otherwise go to landfill. If you prefer to take your own packs to Boots they can be turned into points which can be spent in the store.

What do my empty blister packs get turned into?

When you use the blister pack recycling bin at your local Boots, your empty blister packs are taken to *MYGroup* to give the materials a new lease of life.

MYGroup separates the foil and plastic using a specialised machine and converts all the waste into something new. The now separated metal foil is recycled conventionally (aluminium is infinitely recyclable!) while the plastic is processed into a useable form again such as window frames or piping, or made into a material called MYBoardTM. Nothing goes to landfill and nothing is incinerated. MYBoardTM is used to make a variety of things including tables, children's playgrounds, chairs, garden planters, shop fittings and lots more.

**Bottle tops**. The bottle tops go to Brighton, they are converted into cash and the proceeds go to a children's hospice.

Ensure your bottle tops are clean, dry, and free of any paper, foil, or rubber inserts, especially since contamination can prevent the recycling process. Once collected, these bottle tops are recycled into new products, with the charity earning funds based on the weight of the collected material.

**Writing equipment**. The cash raised from the collection of used pens, pencils and felt tips help to support a *Brain Injuries* charity.

**Stamps Used stamps** are collected to support the RNIB. The stamps will be sold to collectors and dealers to raise funds. Remove the stamp carefully from the envelope, but don't get too close to the stamp's edges. A border of about a centimetre of paper is ideal. The charity accepts all types of stamps, including UK and foreign stamps, first-day covers, and commemorative stamps.

**In the Kitchen** We recycle paper, plastics and glass. Soft plastics are taken to the Co-op for recycling. Tea bags go to Zoe's compost bin.

#### Wildlife Survey

#### 13<sup>th</sup> September 2025 from 11.20am until 12.20pm

The first thing I noticed on arriving at the churchyard was how many bees there were around the south-facing sandy bank. I believe these to be a species of mining bee.

There were more insects attracted to the ivy covering some of the headstones including ladybirds and hoverflies. The only butterflies I saw were some large whites.

Moles were also in evidence, probably glad of some rain making the soil easier to dig!

Lastly the birds spotted were as follows; jackdaw, woodpigeon, wren, robin and blackbird. I was glad to see a blackbird as I fear the numbers are down this year due to the very dry weather making it difficult for them to find worms. There is also a disease around called Usutu Virus

which is leading to dramatic declines in blackbird numbers in some areas of the country. This is caused by a mosquito and is probably linked to the climate emergency.

On that happy note I'll leave you for this month.



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#### **Point to Ponder**

"God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good." (Genesis 1:11)

Our home is a gift from the Creator, and we are trustees of its welfare, tenants of our environment and landowners for the future. We are not given the Earth to squander, waste in self-indulgence, or to deny its rightful place in God's scheme of things.

All too often the history of humanity is a sad reflection of mismanagement, selfish division, and blatant injustice towards those who suffer at the hands of powerful factions who look upon the world as its own.

This month as we celebrate the season of Harvest in our churches and chapels and other places of worship there is a truth to help us remember what lies behind the baskets of fruit and vegetables, packets of pasta and rice and the expected tin of baked beans!

We all depend on one another for our food. However, we are all becoming more aware of the changes these days in our weather patterns at home and abroad. With devastating floods to intense heat waves, we can see the climate changes in our generation not forgetting the warming of the oceans and the threat to wildlife. There is a battle going on for survival not just in our high streets but in our countryside and natural world around us.

There is also the war in Ukraine, the civil unrest in the Sudan, the neverending list of casualties and famine in Gaza and the recent earthquake in Afghanistan. These events remind us that this is not the way God wants us to live in his world. Our Harvest Thanksgiving must spill out into generous support for the suffering and the deprived. However, we need to ask ourselves two important questions "what in the world is going on" and "who do some people think they are?" There is much in this world that divides us from one another and makes us set aside valuable and precious resources that could be used to enhance and heal our brothers and sisters in the struggles against disease, poverty, hunger, and illiteracy.

This is more in keeping with God's view of Harvest. St. Paul uses the idea of harvest as an encouragement to help us all be better human beings. "If a man imagines himself to be somebody, when he is nothing, he is deluding himself...... God is not to be fooled: a man reaps what he sows." (Galatians 6: verses 3 and 7)

There is a spiritual challenge for us all as well as practical matters to consider in our harvest thoughts. In politics we cannot ignore the "green" dimension in planning, nor the social inequalities, nor care for the stranger or neglect our heritage. We cannot escape our international responsibilities and at home we must look after our resources and public services. In our local communities it is essential to be good neighbours. Harvest is a way of life.

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
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
