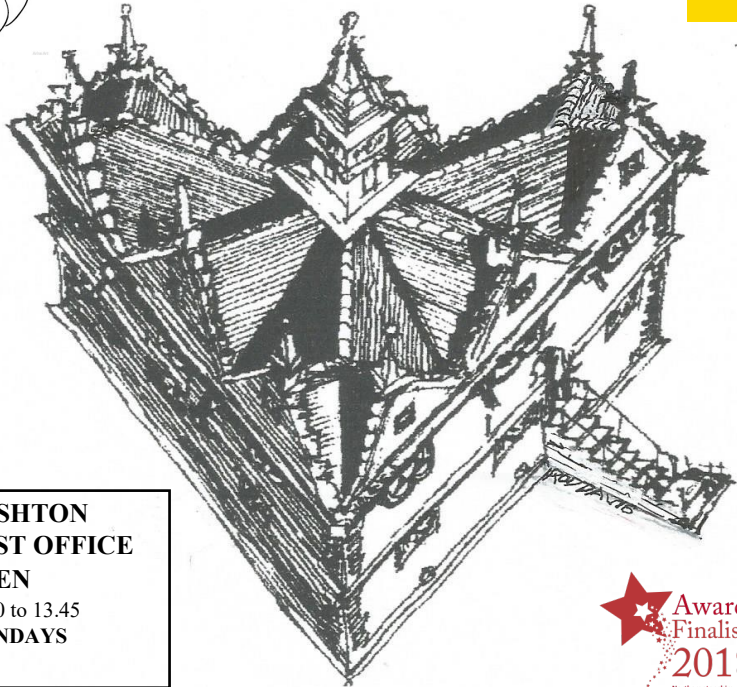

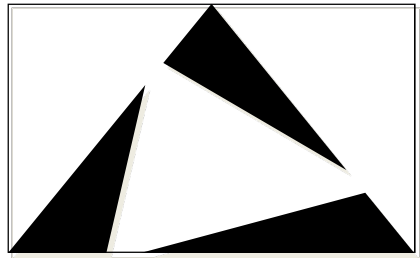

It's a sad fact of life that some things that we now take for granted are not available to people in other parts of the world. The accessibility of education and healthcare here is relatively recent, but sadly already taken for granted and many people have absolutely no idea how lucky they are. Four and a half years ago, the Taliban regime in Afghanistan deprived women and girls of the right to education and the prospect of any career or life outside the home. Don't get sidetracked by the racial or religious arguments - they are obvious - just focus on the mind-boggling notion of not being allowed to learn, plan for a career or exercise any intellectual freedom at all, just because you happen to have been born female. In this country, women didn't have universal suffrage until 1928 - they did not achieve 'equal' pay until 1970/71 - just two examples of our very recent history. The subjugation of women by men is not limited to Afghanistan - it still happens here and in many other countries - it's called 'coercive control', a term which encompasses many degrees of physical and psychological control. There have always been good men, who reached out from behind the curtain of prejudice and conditioning to support and encourage their partners, children or siblings - there are many more now than before, BUT we live in a very strange world, where it is once again fashionable to belittle women and subject them to abuse designed to undermine their equilibrium. Do you remember Trump saying 'Quiet, piggy.' to a female journalist, or Farage, calling Michal Hussein 'dear' when he wanted to deflect an unwanted question? Both recent events. It's frightening. On receipt of a valid request, the Returning Officer will set the date of an election to be held within 60 days of this notice (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and bank holidays), in accordance with Rule 5 of the Local Elections (Parishes and Communities) (England and Wales) Rules 2006.

If an election is not requested, the Parish Council will co-opt a person to fill the vacancy as soon as practicable.

Changes to Recreation Ground Maintenance Funding

Rushton Parish Residents should be aware that, starting from next year, the responsibility for maintaining and repairing the Rushton Recreation Ground will transfer from North Northamptonshire Council to the Parish Council, following a recent notification regarding council budget constraints. This change means that all associated costs will now need to be met locally, and as a result, the parish precept will have to be significantly raised to cover on-going upkeep and repairs.

The shift in responsibility represents a considerable challenge for our community, as the financial burden for essential maintenance and any future repairs will no longer be subsidised. The Parish Council is committed to preserving the quality and safety of the recreation ground, but this will require collective support and understanding from residents. We will be discussing options and implications in upcoming meetings and encourage everyone to share their views and ideas.

Please look out for further updates and opportunities to get involved. Your input will be vital in helping us make the best decisions for the village and its amenities. For any immediate questions or concerns, do not hesitate to contact the Parish Council.

Rushton's Road Issues Update

At the handover meeting with North Northamptonshire Council (NNC), Rushton Parish Council presented our detailed report and signed petition highlighting the longstanding problems affecting our village roads. Unfortunately, NNC made it clear that there is currently no budget allocated for the urgent works our community needs. This news is disappointing, especially considering how these issues impact residents' safety, access, and overall quality of life.

Nevertheless, the Parish Council is determined not to let this setback halt progress. Instead, we are proposing a practical, staged approach to tackling the road issues. By breaking the challenges down into smaller, manageable items, we can make incremental improvements as and when funding becomes available ensuring the community sees real benefits over time, rather than waiting indefinitely for a comprehensive fix.

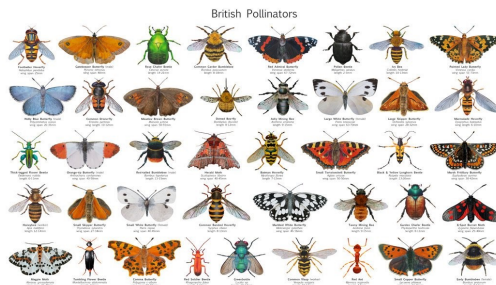

The Parish Council is seeking to appoint a highly organised, self-motivated, and committed applicant to undertake this key role with responsibility for all day-to-day organisation and management of the Council's services and finances.

Rushton Parish Council has 10 Councillors and approximately 600 parishioners with an annual precept of £9,730 for 2026/27

The successful candidate will need to be enthusiastic, flexible, and community-focussed with excellent leadership, administrative, organisational, inter-personal, accounting and IT skills, in order to work successfully with Councillors, external organisations and the community.

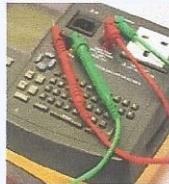

The Pocket Park is 'managed wildness' - the only place in Rushton that is specifically reserved for creatures who are not human - we are just visitors and friends!

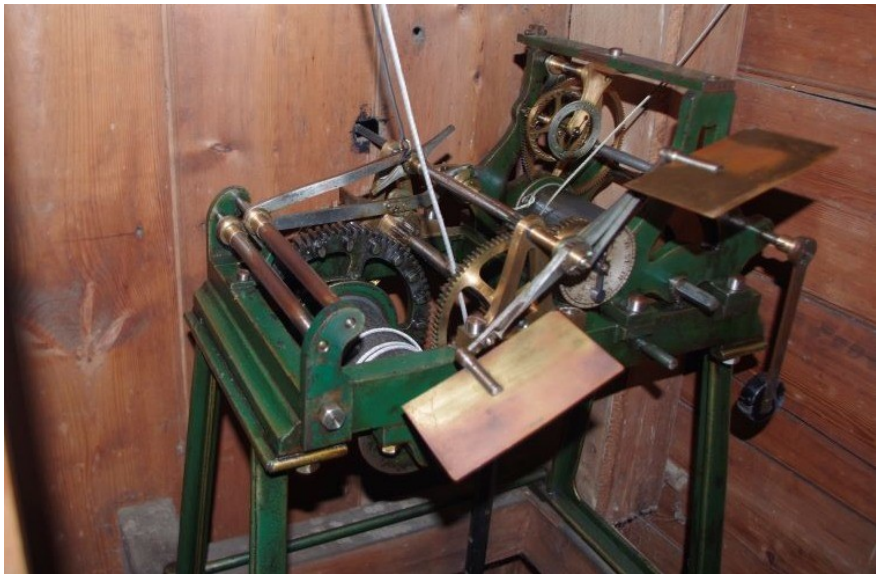
From the Archives

If you have recently driven past Rushton church and have glanced up to the tower to check the time you may have noticed the hands set to 12.00. You may also have missed the hourly chime.



Following over 150 years of service the pulleys on the weight/winding mechanism require new bearings. On Tuesday 19th May, engineers from clock maker Smiths of Derby, who have serviced the clock for over 50 years, attended the church to wind down and release the weights and remove the five pulleys. It is hoped that the refurbished pulleys will be reinstalled within the next five weeks.

The clock was built and installed in the early 1870's by E Dent & Co.



Review: Hamnet at Rushton Roxy Cinema

The much-anticipated screening of **Hamnet** at the Rushton Roxy Cinema offered viewers a moving and beautifully realised portrayal of family, grief, and resilience. Centring on William Shakespeare and his wife Agnes Hathaway as they navigate the devastating loss of their young son, the film proved a poignant closing to this season's programme.

POINT TO PONDER FOR JUNE 2026

I asked an old friend of mine recently if his parish had been able to appoint a new vicar. “Not so far,” he replied. “The applicants we have interviewed turned us down as we did not meet their expectations. So, tell me, George, is there any other form of humanity on this planet we can approach?” There is no reply to that unless we give credibility to the age-old weakness of the “them and us” mentality which diminishes everyone’s humanity! Money, birth, education, geography, religion and so on are strong influences in the “them and us” outlooks we can all have and nobody is immune from them. Looking down on others or being envious or having hatred in our heart restricts our potential for doing good. Incidents of antisemitic behaviour or racial violence are unoriginal and disheartening as are attacks on places of worship. We need to understand and become familiar with those we call “them” in our neighbourhoods. That is one way we can share in the beauty of our humanity and enjoy its diversity. All communities need protecting and not just some from such stupidity. It was ironic that the King’s recent visit to the United States, which some deplored because of President Trump and his emphasis on the “them” aspects of recent policies as well as the negative vibes he made about our country, was a warm diplomatic triumph! The US Congress and politicians welcomed his reminders to our American friends of their own historical aspirations when they founded their nation, than anyone else has done in recent years. The divisive nature of “them” faded away when the King changed the emphasis back to a US understanding of the mutual benefits of being one of “us” in life’s experiences.
